## An example lesson plan

#### Age group and level: Grade 3 (8-9 years)

Date: 19/02/2025

#### Lesson: 4

**Topic:** Food and language for cooking

**Objectives** By the end of the lesson, learners will be able to:

- make polite requests to ask for food items and kitchen equipment to make soup.
- understand and use food vocabulary; onion, carrot, potato, tomato salt and pepper
- understand and use cooking related verbs eat, stir, mix, add

#### Materials

- 1. Bag + Food items (Engage, Activity 1)
- 2. PowerPoint (slides 8-9): Sequencing cards to retell the story (Analysis, activity 1)
- 3. PowerPoint: Vanishing Dialogue (Analysis, activity 2)

Students don't listen – make sure there is a while listening activity

Students lack confidence speaking – drill functional language
