

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Functional language and learning

Functional language are phrases or chunks of language that we use to perform particular functions.


This may include language we use for example in:

- the classroom
- restaurant situations
- to give advice

We find functional language in textbooks in:


- phrases
- language chunks
- dialogues

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
Benefits of functional language teaching

- Students can begin communicative activites quickly
- Shifts dynamic from teacher-led to student focussed classes
- Emphasis shifts from forming correct sentences to producing language
- Promotes easy recall of phrases for specific situations.



Strategies for teaching functional language


- Phrases can be elicited using pictures
- Using various drilling techniques to practice pronunciation e.g. girls then boys, loud and quiet or fast then slow
- Written records of the language can be stuck around the classroom to recycle the vocabulary
- Functional language is also a key feature in writing tasks. Highlight fixed phrases in models for writing e.g. in letters, notices, essays



Continuing Professional Development

- Personal reflective journal


